SIHI CHINA HOLDS "GRANT-O-THON" GRANT WRITING WORKSHOP FOR EARLY-CAREER RESEARCHERS FROM LMICS

Grant Writing Workshop 2024, a series of seven "grant-o-thon" online interactive workshops from 2 April to 14 May 2024, to provide early-career researchers in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) with essential skills and knowledge to write successful grant proposals, particularly for the U.S. National Institutes of Health (NIH).

The free <u>online workshop</u> had more than 400 sign-ups, with 54 submitting their specific aims to join the small group activities. Ultimately, 16 early-career researchers were selected to participate and receive personalised mentorship and guidance from experts, leveraging structured training sessions to equip them with competencies needed to design and submit competitive NIH grant proposals.

The Grant-o-thon Grant Writing Workshop 2024 was co-organised with SIHI, the HOPE consortium, the University of Northern California Center for AIDS Research (UNC CFAR) TechEngage, and the Network of Implementation Science (NISE), in partnership with 4 Youth By Youth (4YBY).

SIHI CHINA HOLDS GLOBAL CROWDSOURCING OPEN CALL & MID-YEAR TRAINING WORKSHOP ON SOCIAL INNOVATION IN HEALTH

rom 1 February to 1 April 2024, SIHI China (SESH) conducted the Social Innovation in Health Learning Competencies Global Crowdsourcing Open Call, which was held in collaboration with SIHI, Sida, and TDR, the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. The open call aimed to identify effective practices and strategies for learning and teaching about social innovation in health, as well as key competencies for design, implementation, and sustainable delivery.

The open call garnered 39 submissions, from which eight finalists were recognised. The finalists were then invited to participate in the co-creation of social innovation training sessions with SIHI network fellows and senior advisers at the <u>Social Innovation in Health Mid-Year Training</u> Workshop.

Held on 4 June-23 July 2024, the interactive workshop had a total of 587 sign-ups and was attended by about 100 to 200 participants per session. It aimed to enhance the understanding of social innovation in health, emphasising its role in driving positive change and improving health outcomes. The workshop was coorganised with SIHI Philippines, the University of North Carolina (UNC) Innovate Carolina, the UNC Center for AIDS Research Technology and Engagement, the Bertha Centre for Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship, SIHI Latin America and the Caribbean, SIHI Uganda, SIHI Sweden, the DERBI Foundation, SIHI Indonesia, SIHI Malawi, SIHI Nigeria, SIHI Rwanda, the International Institute of Information Technology Bangalore Innovation Centre, and Instituto de Enfermedades Infecciosas y Parasitologia Antonio Vidal (Institute of Infectious Diseases and Parasitology Antonio Vidal).

SIHI INDIA COLLABORATES WITH JAYADEVA HEART INSTITUTES FOR HEART4HEALTH HACKATHON

IHI India (DERBI Foundation), in collaboration with the Jayadeva Heart Institutes, held the Heart4Health Hackathon on 12-14 April 2024 at Dayananda Sagar College of Engineering, Bengaluru, India. The hackathon was a concentrated effort to tackle pressing issues in healthcare, specifically in cardiology.

Seventy-six students in 25 teams participated in the hackathon and brought forward innovative solutions that focused on four main issues, namely, clinical reporting, gaps in post-treatment care, better management for patient care, and improving the reliability of step counting devices in cardiac rehabilitation. The event was a platform for healthy competition, learning, and collaboration, with a team from the Al Solutions Department providing mentorship and technical support. There was also a prize money worth INR 30,000 (USD 350).

The Heart4Health Hackathon showcased the fusion of youthful enthusiasm and cutting-edge technology to improve patient outcomes. According to one of the key partners at Jayadeva Heart Institutes,

"[the hackathon] isn't just about the technology; it's about the hearts we can touch and the lives we can change."

The event showed collaboration and the potential of technology to make a difference in people's lives.

SIHI INDIA FACILITATES INTER-INSTITUTIONAL NETWORKING MEETING

IHI India (DERBI Foundation) cofacilitated a networking meeting on 6 March 2024 with India's Inter-institutional Biomedical Innovations Programme (CIBIP), hosted by the Centre for Cellular and Molecular Platforms (C-CAMP). The pivotal meeting was attended by members from medical and engineering institutes. It aimed to foster innovation by converging both disciplines.

CIBIP's mission is to establish a cross-disciplinary academic programme that not only promotes biomedical innovations and entrepreneurship but also integrates these concepts into the standard curriculum of Indian universities, nurturing the next generation of entrepreneurs and innovators. The goal is to create a robust talent pool for bio-innovation entrepreneurship across the country.

The networking meeting was both a gathering and a catalyst for future innovations, bringing together stakeholders from diverse fields to encourage dialogue and collaboration.

SIHI MALAWI HUB SUPPORTS ESTABLISHMENT OF IMPACT HEALTH CATALYST PROJECT

n 29-30 April 2024, the SIHI Malawi team, led by Prof. Don Mathanga and Project Coordinator Andrew Hamuza, attended meetings hosted by the Kamuzu University of Health Sciences (KUHeS) in support of the establishment of the Impact Health Catalyst (IHC) project. The meetings marked the beginning of a collaboration with the University of Melbourne, represented by Prof. Buzz Palmer and Prof. Nancy Baxter.

The IHC project aims to utilise social innovation to strengthen linkages across a broader university-wide network of stakeholders, using health innovation and impact as the common factor. In addition, it seeks to help students develop and implement solutions to health issues, promote health equity, and contribute to inclusive health within the Malawian community.

To support this initiative, the SIHI Malawi hub facilitated a call for ideas from students between 10 and 24 June 2024. Out of 60 submissions, the top five ideas were selected for further development and implementation. The five students who were selected will travel to Australia to work with their counterparts to further develop the innovative ideas. The collaboration promises to bring both technical and financial resources to foster local solutions and empower students to become proactive problem-solvers in health to achieve universal health coverage.



SIHI SOUTH AFRICA HOSTS WEBINAR TO BUILD INTEREST IN OUTCOMES-BASED FINANCE FOR HEALTH

n conjunction with the South African Medical Research Council (SAMRC), <u>SIHI South Africa</u> (Bertha Centre) hosted a <u>webinar</u> on 11 June 2024 titled "Exploring the Opportunity and Assessing Feasibility of the Social Impact Bond (SIB): Lessons from the IMAGINE AGYW and Other SIBs" as part of a series of webinars to build interest in outcomes-based finance for health.

The webinar's agenda featured speakers from Oxford University's Government Outcomes Lab, the Department of Basic Education, the Networking HIV & AIDS Community of Southern Africa (NACOSA), Genesis Analytics, and SAMRC's Office of AIDS and TB Research. Gillian Vedan represented the Bertha Centre.

The webinar was a highlight for the Bertha Centre as it is helping the SAMRC to develop an ecosystem of partners interested in using innovative finance for public health priorities. The invest4health initiative includes a Learning and Action Network and is keen to hear of experiences from across the continent. SIHI MALAWI FACILITATES SOCIAL INNOVATION TRAINING AT KAMUZU UNIVERSITY

ifty-seven participants, including lecturers, innovators, and postgraduate and undergraduate students, attended training sessions on social innovation in health on 28 March and 21 June 2024 at the Kamuzu University of Health Sciences (KUHeS) Lilongwe Campus. SIHI Malawi Project Coordinator Andrew Hamuza and two mentees, Bertha Chakhame and Gaily Lungu, who are lecturers at the university, acted as facilitators.

The training activity was jointly organised by the World Bank's Skills for a Vibrant Economy (SAVE) Project, alongside other facilitators from the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) Malawi. The event, which was a collaborative effort with the different organisations and diverse group of participants, aimed to create a long-term impact on social innovation research and implementation for improved healthcare.

PROGRAM ON SOCIAL INNOVATION AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP IN HEALTH LAUNCHED AT UNIVERSITY OF THE PHILIPPINES MANILA

n 27 June 2024, during the 26th anniversary celebration of the University of the Philippines Manila's National Institutes of Health (NIH), <u>SIHI Philippines</u> was formally <u>relaunched</u> as the Program on Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship in Health to be hosted under the

NIH's Institute of Clinical Epidemiology. This marks a crucial milestone in embedding and institutionalising social innovation in health within the university.

The programme is envisioned to be the country's prime mover and catalyst in research and capacity strengthening to advance social innovations in health, contributing to the transformation of health systems. It will build on the hub's gains over the last seven years and continue the work of supporting social innovations and entrepreneurial initiatives in health. During the anniversary celebration, Dr. Meredith Del Pilar-Labarda, who leads the SIHI Secretariat, also gave a talk on promoting justice and equity through research on social innovations in health. On a separate occasion, UP Manila Chancellor Dr. Michael L. Tee expressed his eagerness to see

the programme's transformation into the Institute of Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship.

SIHI Philippines has conducted several open calls to identify social innovations in health in the country and serves as the secretariat for the Department of Science and Technology's Gelia Castillo Award for Research on Social Innovations in Health.

In 2023, SIHI Philippines launched InnovEx (<u>healthinnovex.org</u>), an online platform for connecting innovators and partners for ideation, collaboration, and building communities of practice.

SIHI INDONESIA CONTINUES COLLABORATION WITH HARAPAN FIAN COMMUNITY

IHI Indonesia continues its collaboration with Harapan Fian from the beginning of 2024. Harapan Fian, a social innovation identified by SIHI Indonesia in 2021, is a community dedicated to serving the marginalised populations in Yogyakarta, Indonesia. Initially, SIHI Indonesia's focus was to document Harapan Fian's innovative Posyandu Jalanan initiative. Now it employs an implementation research approach to enhance capacity for resilience and response to infectious diseases.

The ongoing study, supported by the TDR Small Grant and the Community Service Grant from the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health at Universitas Gadjah Mada (UGM), aims to amplify the impact of Harapan Fian's efforts in improving access to healthcare. The approach extends beyond mere observation as SIHI Indonesia actively disseminates Harapan Fian's successes and challenges. They leverage social media and engage with local government officials to share compelling stories.

Since early 2024, SIHI Indonesia has delved into the complex challenges faced by the urban poor. and how Posyandu Jalanan aids them. More recently, the focus has shifted to bolstering innovative practices. Through research, SIHI Indonesia is committed to fortifying the resilience of Posyandu Jalanan in tackling infectious diseases within the community.

SIHI INDONESIA STRENGTHENS COLLABORATION WITH TDR GLOBAL THROUGH TROPMED MENTORSHIP SERIES

IHI Indonesia conducted a mentorship series from February to June 2024 to strengthen collaboration with TDR Global as part of the implementation of the Health Research Mentorship in Low- and Middle-Income Countries (HERMES). The Tropmed Mentorship Series aimed to support early-career researchers, starting with developing a research concept note for their studies or grant applications. The participants were research staff, including research assistants, project managers, and field staff, from the Center for Tropical Medicine at Universitas Gadjah Mada. SIHI Indonesia acted as the organizing committee and provided the facilitators.

In addition to the one-on-one sessions, a brown bag series was incorporated, where mentees and mentors discussed building research careers. "The mentorship [had] exceeded my expectations. I was hoping to create a concept note that was feasible to do, and that target was achieved. In addition, the brown bag sessions were very helpful in improving my understanding of the research process,"

said Srila Nirmithya Salita Negara, one of the mentees. In the future, SIHI Indonesia aims to continue working closely with TDR Global, not only for mentorship but also to integrate a wide pool of research talent from TDR with SIHI Indonesia's identified social innovations.

SIHI UGANDA HUB HOLDS FINAL CAPACITY-BUILDING WORKSHOP FOR 2023-2024

n 12-15 February 2024, the SIHI Uganda hub held the third and final capacity-building workshop at the Resilient African Network (RAN) conference room of the Makerere University School of Public Health in Kampala, Uganda.

The workshop was one of three face-to-face workshops implemented under the Makerere University Social Innovation in Health Fellowship Program, which is a modular six-month distance learning program aimed to equip participants with skills in innovation, project planning and management, entrepreneurship, monitoring and evaluation. research. communication. fundraising. and environmental impact assessment.

The final workshop focused on effective communication, fundraising, and environmental and social impact assessment. SIHI UGANDA HOLDS DISSEMINATION WORKSHOPS TO HIGHLIGHT SOCIAL INNOVATION PROJECT RESULTS

IHI Uganda organised two dissemination workshops to highlight the results of its social innovation projects and stimulate partnerships between innovators and policymakers. The first workshop was the 5th Social Innovation in Health Stakeholders' Workshop held on 30 April 2024 at the Golf Course Hotel in Kampala. It served as a platform to showcase 12 health and gender social innovation projects, disseminate their research findings, and celebrate the completion of the 2023-2024 cohort of the Makerere University Social Innovation in Health Fellowship Program. The participants included policymakers from the Ministry of Health, officials from the Kampala City Council Authority, social innovators, gender experts, academic staff from Makerere University, and SIHI partners.

The second workshop was a regional dissemination workshop held on 23 May 2024 in Luwero District to raise awareness on social innovation in health and facilitate collaboration for innovative community-level health interventions.

Participants in this workshop included social innovators and district officials from Luwero, Nakaseke, Nakasongola, and Kiryandongo.

Three social innovation health projects were disseminated: the Baby Ubuntu Programme, which builds caregivers' capacity to support children with disabilities in the Nakasongola District; the Parenting for Respectability Program in Luwero and Nakaseke, which addresses gender-based violence (GBV) and family health relations; and OPWIG's Care Group in Kiryandongo, which promotes health education among refugees, tackling issues such as malnutrition, health-seeking practices, and GBV.


SIHI LAC PUBLISHES CASE COMPENDIUM AND SAK MANUAL FOR 2024

uring the first half of 2024, the SIHI Latin America and the Caribbean hub achieved two important milestones in its efforts to promote equity and access to health knowledge. In collaboration with the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), the compendium "Social Innovation in Health: Lessons for Advancing Equity" was published, bringing together 17 transformative initiatives that have improved access to health services in remote areas and applied innovative technologies to diagnose and treat diseases more efficiently.

In addition, the Manual for the Social Appropriation of Knowledge, titled "ABC of the Social Appropriation of Knowledge," was finalised. This manual is a guide designed to strengthen the capacity of researchers to socialise knowledge, encouraging participation and dialogue in research projects. This manual contributes to a more inclusive and participatory science, in line with the guidelines of the Colombian Ministry of Science. Both achievements underline the hub's commitment to health equity and community empowerment through knowledge.

SIHI SWEDEN HOLDS A WORKSHOP WITH THE BERTHA CENTRE AT THE SASUF SUSTAINABILITY FORUM

ats Målqvist, <u>SIHI Sweden</u> director, hosted a workshop together with Katusha De Villiers of the Bertha Centre for Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship, at the <u>SASUF</u> Sustainability Forum on 15-17 May 2024 in Malmö, Sweden.

The workshop, titled Scaling-up social innovations: the challenge of contextualization and mutual learning, explored the challenges and possibilities of transferring and scaling-up social innovations across diverse settings. This is essential in order to meet universal health coverage, which is one of the targets of SDG 3. Utilizing the example of the Philani model, they hosted an interactive panel discussion on this theme. Outcomes from the workshop were shared learning, insights, and practical guidance on how to work in the field of social innovation for health to increase impact and achieve societal transformation.

This joint workshop also served as an opportunity to strengthen the connection and collaboration between Uppsala University and the University of Cape Town within the frame of the SIHI network and beyond.

SIHI MALAWI PRODUCES VIDEO DOCUMENTARY ON SOCIAL INNOVATION THAT HELPED VICTIMS OF CYCLONE FREDDY

n June 2024, SIHI Malawi released a video documentary showcasing a social innovation that was identified from its call for solutions in 2023. The innovation sought to improve access to mental health care through the integration of digital platforms. There was an opportunity to use it when Cyclone Freddy hit that same year. More than 500 Malawians who were affected by the cyclone were able to benefit from the innovation.

Currently, this innovation has potential to help people affected by climate change-induced disasters, including farmers and agricultural workers. Tendai Machaya, an innovator from St. John of God College of Health Sciences, explained, "these natural disasters we are talking about, they are here to stay, now we are talking about El Niño which is coming, which might cause some distress to farmers, they need telecounselling."

aría Guadalupe, a 22-year-old Nicaraguan woman, learned about the online health promotion platform, JovenSalud.net, through Facebook. She was the first person in her family to go to university and entered just when her mother migrated from the country looking for new opportunities to support her daughter's dream. María Guadalupe had to migrate to the country's capital to attend university. The JovenSalud.net platform became a great support, especially the service "Looking for Advice?"

"I found out about JovenSalud.net through Facebook," Maria Guadalupe said. "I wasn't sure at first that I would like it, but I love the platform. I contacted the TeenSmart staff in my country and told them that I wanted to support and volunteer. From there, I became a leader of JovenSalud and a co-creator of the content for the new intervention 'My Future Without Borders.' The whole experience has been a delight!"
